Pictured on the next page are three of the several AICM notice boards to be found in Kabale and its surrounding area in South-West Uganda. They are a symbol of the outstretched, helping hands of Christ amongst these very needy, lovely people.



For me, they represent desperate need and a challenge. Increasingly, reports from UK visitors to Kabale and visits to UK from Kabale by Enoch, the founder Director, and Timothy, the current Director, keep underlining the desperate funding requirements

of AICM in order to maintain its services at the current level. In spite of this, it is an organisation that cannot stand still in the face of obvious need, and so it is ever seeking to do more.

We hear that the VTC struggles to fund staff adequately and facilities as it caters for ever increasing demands from students. Currently, it is seeking a new director and it needs to expand its buildings. We praise God that Christian commitment and worship are central to its activities.

It is a challenge for us to provide for its continued witness.

We praise God that AICM employs faithful extension workers who travel by motorbike, bicycle and even by foot, across rough terrain into rural areas to encourage and support in areas of health, agriculture, handicrafts, dance, drama, income-



generating projects such as bee keeping, and of course, bible teaching. But these extension workers have families, often extended families, and are paid meagre salaries, often in arrears. They give much as a service to God, but AICM needs to pay them a better wage, and that is a challenge to us.

There are other activities, including the whole matter of the Batwa (pigmy) re-settlement programme, which includes the AICM Batwa community schools. The funding needs are constant.

I suppose I am putting these thoughts into words in an effort to inspire



you, our faithful readers, perhaps to become a little more active; perhaps to offer to help us here in the UK (the trustees would value offers of help); perhaps to broadcast the work of AICM amongst your friends, your church fellowship or school (it would be great to get more supporting churches and schools

He and the extension workers represent the main core of the work of AICM.

Global Giving



The Challenge and BEYOND

At the beginning of April, the Friends of AICM secured a provisional place on the UK site

of the international charitable giving site, globalgiving.co.uk. This site raises the profile of many small charities by giving them a much wider audience. It is secure and well managed. In order to achieve a permanent place on the site, Global Giving required us to raise a minimum of £1000 from 50 unique sponsors during April. Our initial project was to raise funds to aid the primary education of Batwa children in our two schools at Rwamahano and Muribindi. We knew from Timothy that AICM had insufficient funds to provide school lunches and other essential materials like school uniform and materials. Also, they struggle to fund the teachers' salaries and teacher training. That is why we chose the "Pygmy Education" project. We are so thankful to the many who responded to our requests to give in so short a time, and we praise God that we did meet and exceed the challenge by

ultimately raising more than £1500! These funds will make all the difference in the world to a marginalised group who have nothing. So we now have a permanent place, and our work is only just beginning! This project has a way to go to meet its target - another £4000 or so.



This will preserve these children's education for a few years and we shall, in time, be adding other projects.

So, please continue to visit the site and broadcast it to as many as possible. It has a link to our own website, so we hope many will visit that also and learn more about our work. This will tell folk about lots of other ways to give. We are aware that giving for a few can become a burden, and so the more who become aware of the work of AICM, the better it will be, as God`s work in Kabale and beyond does depend very much on adequate funding.

July will see the departure of five trustees and eight new supporters as they fly off to Uganda. They intend to explore some of the country's beautiful scenery and wildlife and also to spend about a week visiting some of AICM's projects. We wish them well and look forward to some interesting stories when they return.



Rydal Penrhos School visit to AICM

In the same period, but as a separate venture, Phil and Anne Simpson, who are long-standing friends of AICM, are leading a party of four sixth-form pupils and three other staff from his school to Uganda this summer. They will be spending a few days in Kabale from 16-19 July to see the VTC and other aspects of AICM's work Rydal Penrhos is an independent boarding school situated at Colwyn Bay on the North Wales coast and has a Methodist Church foundation. This visit is part of their World AIMS (Action in Methodist Schools) programme in partnership with the Methodist Relief and Development.

The group will also be visiting an MRDF funded rural development project near Mbarara and some schools in Mbarara. Phil and his school chaplain Rev Keith Tewkesbury went to Uganda last February on a fact-finding tour and made the links



with the schools through the British Council. Then in May 2008 Timothy was able to spend a couple of days at Rydal Penrhos meeting pupils and staff.

Since the autumn, pupils and staff at Rydal Penrhos have been raising money in different ways (including cake and craft sales, a fancy-dress day with a circus theme, selling Christmas cards) and have achieved a total of nearly £2,000 to donate to AICM, RUHEPAI (the MRDF sponsored project) and the schools in Mbarara, in addition to raising the costs of the trip (approximately £1,400 each).

Rydal Penrhos is really hoping that these links with Uganda, including AICM, will grow in strength as a result of this year's visit and that such visits will become a regular two-yearly event.



Craft Items for Sale

As part of the ongoing efforts of AICM in Uganda and The Friends of AICM to establish sustainable income generating activities, a

number of craft items made by the Ihunga Women's Groups have been imported to the UK and went on sale to staff at the Charities Aid Foundation recently. A total in excess of £370 was raised which will be used to purchase and ship more goods to the UK as well as providing an

injection of £200 to assist the Ihunga Women's Groups. This is an ongoing initiative that can only benefit from greater involvement from supporters of The Friends of AICM.
